## A CONTEMPORARY EXODUS STORY: "GOD'S POSSIBILITY PEOPLE"

Forty years ago on April 30th 1975, the Dinh family prayed for deliverance as they trusted only in the Lord God Almighty. They sat in two small boats alongside relatives listening to news on the radio — South VietNam had fallen to communist forces. If they returned to the shore, they might be killed or would not have freedom. Where would they go if they remained in a boat with waves lapping over the bow? Believing "With God, all things are possible," they remained steadfastly in prayer, then and now. Throughout life, they found divine grace and God's provision amidst the most challenging predicament.

Far from being 'empty nesters', these couples had young children. The Thorsens had Julie (age 4) and baby Ken and the Freas family had Sean (3) and Joy (1).

On November 17, 1975, forty years ago, the Dinhs arrived in Cincinnati and lived with the Thorsen and Freas families for three months. That sounds simple, but the Dinh family included the parents Hoc Van Dinh & Duom Thi Mai and ten children: Tuyet (age 20), Hoang (18),

Anh (16), Nguyet (13), Nguyen (11), Thong (9), Tuan now Andrew (7), Thu (5), Kim Thanh (3) & baby Nhan (3 months).

The father Hoc Dinh was hired by CHPC as a custodian. The oldest son Hoang held another job to support the family. The Deacons provided transportation for the Dinh family. Merrimates (today's Supper Club) provided the tuition for five children to attend Catholic Schools: Anh – Our Lady of Angels HS, and St. Clare elementary school for Nguyet, Nguyen, Thong and Tuan. Three year old Thu attended preschool through a scholarship from The Lord's Covenant School.

In February 1976, the Dinh family left Cincinnati to find a place to live in a Vietnamese community. After moving to Grannis, Arkansas and Bridge City, Louisiana, they chose San Jose, California, with a large Vietnamese community as their permanent residence. On June 3, 1978, Tuyet graduated in accounting from Xavier University and pursued her career as an accountant in San Jose.

For thirty years, we lost contact with the Dinh family. Imagine our surprise and delight when we received a phone call on January 18, 2015, from Nguyet. Her first words were, "We remember and we pray for your families."

On April 4, 2015, several members of the Dinh family are flying from San Jose to Cincinnati to say, "Thank You!" On Easter Sunday, members of the Dinh family including Mom - Duom Mai, Tuyet, Hoang, Anh and Nguyet with her husband Dang and two children – Matthew and Catherine, will worship with us at CHPC.

Dave & Nancy Thorsen and David & Carol Freas are thanking the Lord for time to reconnect with the Dinh family and are so happy that they are coming to visit. The Dinh family has lived the message of the resurrection power of Jesus Christ celebrated on Easter Sunday! They know in a very personal way that "With God all things are possible" *Matt 19:26*.

The Lord has been a source of strength and provision for a lifetime for the Dinh family. The father Hoc Van Dinh and mother Duom Thi Mai lived in North VietNam until 1945. During WWII the Japanese occupied North VietNam. They burned all the country's rice supply to make charcoal to run the trains for war. This created a horrible famine and over a million people died. To survive many country people including the parents and relatives of Hoc and Duom moved to the more fertile South VietNam. The family lived in Long Khanh, close to Saigon.

During the VietNam conflict, the father Hoc Dinh fought for the South. He left ten children to the care of his wife. In early March 1975, the Vietnamese War escalated. The extended family left their two huge homes to take refuge in another town. Mother Duom worried about her family's economic situation. She sent her oldest daughter Tuyet to Phuoc Tuy which is close to the sea to buy dried fish for resale. Ultimately the family went to live in the Mekong River Delta near Phuoc Tuy with the families of two cousins.

As the war was ending, the family sold their last possessions and bought food and a radio. They sailed into the East Viet-Nam Sea in two boats with their relatives. They prayed, not knowing where to sail. The Lord provided by sending an American freighter which stopped and allowed them to climb up a high rope ladder to the deck. The ship took them to Guam where they stayed for two months before coming to Fort Chaffee near Little Rock Arkansas.

When they arrived in Arkansas, they were given Bibles by the Gideons. They often read God's Word and prayed. Some Vietnamese priests who studied abroad provided leadership for their spiritual lives. The Dinh family were devout Catholics who went to Mass each morning in VietNam. Mrs. Duom Mai continues to attend Mass daily. Catholic Charities worked with American sponsors to relocate them in the United States. Two families, who were neighbors in College

### LENTEN ACTIVITY for SMALL GROUPS & FAMILIES

YOU WILL NEED: 7 candles and candle holders. Map of Israel.

WHAT YOU DO: Light all candles. Week 1, darken one. Week 2, darken one more, etc. Recite the meaning of each candle as it is extinguished. Each is a Jesus place, an event and a betrayal.

MEANING: **7th candle: Egypt** (Peril). **6th: Nazareth** (Rejection). **5th: Galilee** (Discipling). **4th: SAMARIA** (Teaching). **3rd: BETHANY**(Healing). **2nd: CAESAREA PHILIPPI** — Revelation. Here, the Holy Spirit revealed to a few the full nature of Jesus, the Messiah, the Son of the Living God. But the purpose of His life — His death for our sin and His resurrection — remained a secret, not yet fully revealed.

DISCUSS: Read Matt 16:13-20 and Mark 8:27-33. Reflect on the text. Parents explain what the passage means in terms your children will understand. Jesus experienced huge disappointments in life.

ACTIVITY: Locate the ancient Roman city of Caesarea Philippi on a map. Hint: it was north of the Sea of Galilee and west of Mt Hermon. Why was Jesus so mad at Peter? Where did Jesus and the disciples go after these event?



Are you brave? Many would say they are not, some would say they are. The Apostle Peter was at times cowardly and at other times brave; and Peter is the topic of our upcoming seven-week Adult Spiritual Formation curriculum called "Brave". It is an all-church Journey because all 15 classes during the 10:10 Foundational Hour will be discussing it, as will some small groups in the evening. We might call it a community-wide Journey because many churches throughout the Greater Cincinnati Area will be studying this series as well. As some of you have experienced in the Journeys of previous years, this city-wide exposure has the potential for great impact. The "Brave" series begins April 12, the Sunday after Easter, and runs for seven weeks.
