

The Church's Liturgical Year: Advent - "God from God, Light from Light."

What do you see? What does this symbol have to do with Advent?

The Advent season in the life of the Church is a time of preparation for the celebration of Jesus Christ's birth and His second coming at the end of time. In these trying times, **CHPC's 2015 Advent Preaching Series focuses on HOPE... real hope.**

On Nov 29th, we introduced the Celtic symbol for Hope. Christians like St Patrick combined a never-ending, interwoven circle with a Celtic knot — a symbol of God's love revealed by the Holy Trinity. This whole symbol predates the use of the cross by Christians.

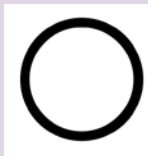
The first Sunday of Advent, this part of the symbol was used. Looking like a candle on a stand, it pointed to Jesus Christ, the HOPE and *Light of the World* who comes to *ordinary* men and women ...people open to God: like Mary, Joseph and John the Baptist in the backwater area of Nazareth.



The 2nd Sunday of Advent, the same symbol was inverted, so it seems to rest on a center point with outstretched hands, a bit like a spinning top. It is a reminder of *the plans of God in the hands of God.* We

discovered why the Apostle Paul wrote about Jesus being born "*In the fullness of time....*"

This third Sunday, the circle symbolizes the One that is our HOPE, Jesus Christ. The Apostle John writes, "*He was in the beginning with God; all things were made through him, and without him was not anything made that was made. In him was life, and the life was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.*" (John 1:2-3)



The former chaplain of the Senate preaching on John's passage asked, "What part of ALL don't you understand?" Reminders of ALL are everywhere: in jewelry, target bullseyes, sun and moon, coinage, wheels, china, even *Lord of the Rings*. Christmas is no exception.

CHRISTIAN ADVENT WREATH

The Advent wreath ties the circular Christ symbol to that of light. The tradition of the lighting 4 candles placed in a circle sometimes with evergreens comes from Northern Europe. Examples:



In the 1500's Martin Luther popularized using an Advent wreath as a Christian-education device. While not described in Scripture, lighting Advent candles is

similar to the role prescribed by God for lighting the 7-candle menorah in the Temple, and the Jew's practice of lighting 8-candles for Hanukkah. Both were designed as acts of obedience honoring God and giving Him the Glory.

Like the celebration of Passover, when the Maccabees instituted Hanukkah about 165BC they expected that the candle-lighting would be a family affair celebrated in the home. Members of the family joined in to *remember* the miracle of God. This year Hanukkah's 8 nights are Dec 16 to Dec 24.

LIGHT UP CHRISTMAS by making candle-lighting and prayer around an Advent Wreath part of your daily activities. Refocus on the coming of Christ, the true LIGHT of life. Try it as part of a meal. The family or a group gathers around the wreath and lights the appropriate candles. Do a prayer based on the Advent wreath reading and Scripture. Let the candles burn during the meal. Singles can join with others or have their own wreath and prayer time. Be open to the LIGHT and HOPE that God wants to bring to your life this Advent. Jesus, through whom ALL things were made, makes it possible.

TRADITIONAL ADVENT SYMBOLS: **1st** — the first [purple] candle is the "Prophecy Candle" that reminds us of the prophets who foretold Christ's birth. God is faithful to fulfill His promises. "Our HOPE comes from the Lord." (Romans 15:12-13). **2nd** — the "Bethlehem Candle" symbolizes Christ's birthplace as God promised. A star led the Wise Men to Christ child. Ask God to cause you to 'get ready' for Jesus. (Luke 3:4-6) **3rd** — the "Shepherds Candle" is for the ordinary people who had their fear replaced joy and HOPE. (Luke 2:7-15). **4th** — the "Angels' Candle" is lit for God's divine messengers. They came to declare 'Glory to God' first and then announce Jesus — God with us. The Savior of the World. (John 3:16-17)
