**“The best of times and the worst of times...”**

On this fourth Sunday of Advent surrounded by all the World's and the Church's lovely trappings of Christmas, we may be tempted to forget the real *picture* of Christ's birth. The manger sits in stark contrast to the glitter and glitz. Eugene Petersen's *Message* paraphrase puts it this way: John 1:14

The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood. We saw the glory with our own eyes, the one-of-a-kind glory, like Father, like Son.

Jesus came *in the fullness of time*, but it took a long time for this to happen. Around us, the World says, “Be happy...it's Christmas time.” But many people this Christmas are lamenting — crying out, longing, hoping, asking God to show up in *their neighborhood* or to show up in the circumstances of those they love and pray for, including themselves.

They may have turned away from God or feel abandoned in their grief and struggle. Those who awaited Christ's birth more than 2000 years ago shared such feelings. Psalm 22 — verse 1 says, *My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from my cries of anguish?* Psalm 54:1-2 cry out: *Save me, O God, by your name; vindicate me by your might. Hear my prayer, O God; listen to the words of my mouth.*



Israel 'actively lamented.' The Prophet Isaiah spelled out the details — God's people searched the Scriptures, established traditions that helped them to acknowledge how God acted on His people's behalf in the past; were specific about their need, confessed their sin; asked for God's forgiveness and help; and affirmed their trust in Him that He would respond.

When Jesus arrived, Israel was weary of waiting. Yet, some of those who were looking for God to answer their prayers would:  
1. Travel to a back-water town filled to overflowing with strangers, only to lodge in a cold stable with animals [Mary & Joseph];  
2. Encounter supernatural beings who challenged them to abandon their jobs and their peaceful rural solitude [Shepherds];  
3. Leave their familiar surroundings and go to a distant land by following an astronomical phenomenon [Magi].  
In the Bible, Matthew 1-2:12 and Luke 1:1-79 tell the story. They all met at a manger to witness the arrival of a child unlike any other.

Today, wise men and women still come to the manger. They trust that whatever their lament, Jesus has come into *their neighborhood*. Thru hospitality, they meet and share Him — the pure, sinless, spotless Savior of the World. The Good News is that those who receive Him are freed from their sins and transformed by God's great love revealed through the Holy Spirit. In gratitude, they cannot help but join the angels in singing: *Glory to God in the highest, and on the earth peace among men and women with whom He is well pleased.* Luke 2:14.

**Manger - Creche - Nativity Scenes**

When I was a child, our family could only afford a short Christmas tree. My father sat it upon two beer cases which left plenty of room underneath. *The star* hung from the lower branches of the tree. Our Nativity (the one with a sheep with a toothpick leg) sat underneath with the train village. Our family wasn't very religious, but our Manger scene of the Incarnation not only completed the Christmas decor, but offered a tangible tool for reflecting on the source of our joy.

Our Baby Jesus didn't arrive until Christmas Day. On Christmas Eve, mother would remove all the 'supporting characters,' wrap them in newspaper comics and put them in a basket. The Christmas Story would be read before dinner the next day. After we ate, the basket would appear. Each diner would pick a wrapped figure and tell about it as if he/she was that person. Over the years, Mary, Joseph, the Wisemen and Jesus became *old friends*. Later, I came to know Jesus as my Savior and Lord.

The Nativity scene appears in 2nd Century Roman catacombs frescos. 1223AD, St. Francis of Assisi Italy created the first living Nativity scene with animals only. He used it to preach to the people about the *King for the Poor*. Overwhelmed with the Love of God, he was unable to utter Jesus Christ's name. St. Francis called Him the *Babe of Bethlehem*.



Half a century later, the first stationary Nativity scene with all the humans was crafted in marble. German Prince Albert, husband of England's Queen Victoria, introduced a life-sized Nativity to the court. Manger scenes became *the fashion*. They seem to be limited only by the imagination. 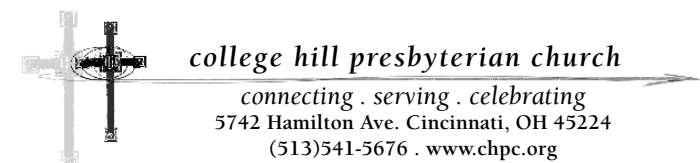
