

## The Church's Liturgical Year : Epiphany - The Light to the Gentiles



Wise Men Still Seek Him

**Twelfth Night** - The climax of the Advent/Christmas Season and the Twelve Days of Christmas is Epiphany — counted from the evening of December 25th until the morning of January 6th. In the Church Calendar — 'The 3 Kings Day' celebrates Christ, the Light of the World, being revealed to the *Gentiles*. In Central and South America, this is so central to Churches' traditions that believers open Christmas presents on The 3 Kings Day, or late on the night before not Dec 25th.

**We Three Kings of Orient Are...** When I was doing research for this year's Advent series, I was surprised to find out that this Christmas carol may have been in error.

In 1857 John Henry Hopkins Jr, rector of Christ Episcopal Church in Williamsport PA, wrote the music and words for "We Three Kings" for a college Christmas pageant. It was the first American Christmas carol to be popular in Europe. It was added to the Episcopal Hymnal in 1916 and included in the 1928 Oxford Book of Carols as "one of the most successful of modern composed carols." Unfortunately Hopkins took poetic license.

In Matthew's Gospel it says: Magi [wise men/scholars] from the East came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him... On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh." [Matt 2:2,3,11]

Magi is a term that appeared in 6th Century BC Greek literature and Persian/ Iranian literature the 5th Century BC. Matthew's gospel reports that these magi were star-watchers, non-Jews from the East who came in search of the 'King of the Jews.' It doesn't say how many came although *magi* is plural. They were guided by God and brought their finest gifts, ones *predicted 8 centuries earlier*.

A party of only three travelers is unlikely. In those days people of wealth would travel in a donkey or camel caravan with body guards. At 10 to 25 miles/day through heat, cold, storms and deprivation, it was a long trip. They clearly did not visit Jesus when he was still lying in

the manger. As befits wise men, they asked for directions in the big city where the kings lived' — Jerusalem. They obviously had a lot of prestige to gain an audience with King Herod. Matthew 2:16 implies that Herod learned from the wise men that up to two years had passed since the birth. So Herod ordered the slaughter of all male children two years or younger in Bethlehem.

Sound extreme? Herod was paranoid and wanted no threats to his throne, especially from an unknown 'King of Jews.' Although a practicing Jew, Herod was far from 'the lineage of David.' In fact, his father Antipater was an Edomite (an Arab from the region between the Dead Sea and the Gulf of Aqaba). Herod even killed his own firstborn son, his wife, and other potential heirs from his family. No wonder God told the Holy Family to flee to Egypt until Herod died.

**Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh**  
I wonder why the Magi brought these gifts. They were typical gifts for honoring a king or deity in the ancient world. Isaiah 60:6, when describing Jerusalem's glorious restoration, tells of nations and kings who will come and "bring gold and frankincense and shall proclaim the praise of the Lord."

Gold provided the family's traveling money and sustenance. Frankincense and Myrrh were even more valuable than gold. These precious bead-like crystal of tree saps/resins were harvested on the Horn of Africa and the coastal countries of the Arabian Peninsula. They would be the family's treasure used for incense, perfume, healing, anointing and preparation for burial...a foretelling.

I recently reread a tiny book: *The Other Wise Man* by Henry Van Dyke. A Wise Man from Babylonia sold all he had to buy three jewels, so that he might *have joy in finding the One who is worthy to be served*. Too late to travel with the first group, he kept seeking and encountered King Jesus in unexpected everyday ways throughout his life.

May we each experience God's Epiphany — the Light of the World — and offer Him our lives and gifts for His Glory, day by day.
